THIS STRUCTURE HELPS WRITERS PRESENT THEIR ARGUMENTS IN A BALANCED AND LOGICAL MANNER, MAKING IT EASIER FOR READERS TO FOLLOW AND UNDERSTAND THEIR POINTS.

COUNTERARGUMENTS
