## **Messaging and Communication**

## App Store and Third-Party Applications

While the iPhone 4 comes with pre-installed apps, its true power lies in the vast ecosystem of the App Store. To access it, tap the App Store icon. Here, you can download millions of applications for entertainment, productivity, education, and more. Some apps are free, while others require a purchase. You can search for specific apps or browse categories.

## Capturing Memories with the Camera
