His critique was not against the Law itself, but against human attempts to circumscribe God's will within rigid, often self-serving, human traditions.

## **Jesus' Interpretation of Key Laws**

Jesus' ministry was characterized by his distinctive interpretations of specific commandments within the Mosaic Law, often challenging the status quo and the interpretations of the religious elite. His re-evaluation did not dismiss the Law but sought to reveal its core purpose and its connection to a deeper, more profound form of discipleship.

### **The Sabbath Commandment**

Jesus' most famous encounters concerning the Law often revolved around the Sabbath. He consistently challenged the rigid and often burdensome interpretations of Sabbath observance that had developed over time. His declaration that "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath" (Mark 2:27) encapsulates his perspective. His teaching that "it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but what comes out of the mouth" (Matthew 15:11) marked a radical reinterpretation of dietary and ritualistic purity. This statement suggested that true defilement originated from the heart—from sinful thoughts and intentions—rather than from external contact with unclean things or people. This emphasis shifted the locus of religious concern from external ritual to internal character.

## Dietary Regulations

While not explicitly rescinding all dietary laws, Jesus' interactions and teachings suggest a loosening of their absolute binding authority in the new covenant. His willingness to eat with tax collectors and sinners, who often violated strict dietary observances, indicated a broader inclusiveness. Furthermore, the early church, guided by apostles like Peter and Paul, would eventually clarify that the ceremonial aspects of these laws were fulfilled in Christ and no longer binding on Gentile believers.

Jesus' actions and teachings around food and ritualistic cleanness pointed towards a new era where the relationship with God was not primarily mediated by adherence to a complex system of external regulations, but by faith and an inner transformation. This was a precursor to the broader theological understanding that would develop regarding the obsolescence of certain Old Testament ceremonial laws in light of Christ's redemptive work.

This imagery underscored his view that their meticulous application of the Law was a facade that masked a deeper spiritual corruption.

# **The Greatest Commandment and the Law**

In one of his most significant pronouncements, Jesus identified two commandments as the greatest, effectively summarizing the essence of the entire Law. When asked by a lawyer which commandment was the most important, Jesus replied, “‘Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.’ This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’ All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments” (Matthew 22:37-40).

This declaration was revolutionary. By placing love at the forefront, Jesus reoriented the understanding of the Law’s purpose. He posited that all the intricate details of divine statutes, from the Ten Commandments to the sacrificial system, were fundamentally expressions or implications of these two overarching principles of love. This shifted the focus from a checklist of rules to a relational and dispositional approach to faith and obedience.

Jesus consistently demonstrated that love was the foundational principle that underpinned all divine commandments. His own actions were a testament to this, as he consistently showed compassion, mercy, and self-sacrifice towards those on the margins of society.
